

Physical Development

Moving to Write- + / \ pre writing shapes. Stretching core muscles and developing core strength.

Children will progress towards a more fluent style of moving, with developing control and grace. Continue will develop their small motor skills so that they can use a range of tools competently, safely and confidently; pencils for drawing and writing, paintbrushes, scissors, knives, forks and spoons. Children will show a dominant hand and begin to use anti-clockwise movements and retrace vertical lines. Some children will begin to form some letters correctly. Children will learn to combine different movements with ease and fluency. Daily toothbrushing.

Developing pencil grips. Releasing objects, matching lids, marble runs, building tracks.

Children will use language related to position to describe where an object is; on, under, next to, infront of, behind.

Children will compare small groups of objects using language of fewer than, more than.

Children will explore 2D shapes and look at properties of shape. Children will print with 2D shapes and everyday objects looking at the prints left behind.

To enjoy an increasing range of books.

Use vocabulary that is increasingly influenced by books.

The children will continue to enjoy and join in with rhymes and songs We are continuing to follow the Letters and Sounds Phonics programme. Some children will be accessing the Read, Write, Inc scheme of work in which they will be exposed to letter sounds.

Some children will hear and say the initial sounds in words.

Name recognition and name building.

Children will explore mark making in a variety of forms; whiteboards, blackboards, easels, rolls of paper, Ipads, interactive touch pads, sensory trays, paint.

In writing children will learn to add some marks to their drawings, which they give meaning to, begin to use some print/letter knowledge in writing and engage in purposeful writing.
